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choose a running mate. I'm trying to make this as basic, as fundamental as I can to show why I don't want the constitution cluttered, and why I don't even see the need to enact a statute. We don't have to do that. You're talking about party discipline, party activity, party campaigning. Let them do all of that they want to, but it does not have to embroil the Legislature in these little micromangement activities to make some people feel secure. You all are going to give the National Guard 75 percent tuition assistance. Well, aren't you told that you can rest well at night because you're in the hands of your National Guard? They feel even better about you now than they did before you upped the assistance you gave them. So these party people who are worried, let them call the National Guard and be reassured that everything is all right. Just sit back and be cool and let this person who's running for Governor make his or her choice. Suppose that person belonging to "Party A"...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...would decide to nominate a person who ran for Governor with "Party B", because that person has changed his or her mind and is now available. Well, with what you all are talking about, that could not be done. Leave that to the activities of a partisan nature which govern the way elections are determined now. I know that Senator Schimek is going to withdraw her motion, but, since we have the opportunity to compile a record, I wanted these comments of mine to be in the record and, if necessary, I will get them transcribed and send copies to these party...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...moguls so they can be reassured.
