or oppose it, but I think it's time to let the Lieutenant (sic) Governor choose their running mate and I believe there's a majority of the people on this floor agree with me. That was shown in the Government Committee, it was shown on General File, and I think it will stand today. I'm not sure we're going to accomplish much, Senator Bromm, by bracketing this motion for...so, from that standpoint, I would oppose the bracket.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Chambers, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I believe the amendment to the constitution where the one vote would be cast jointly was in 1970, '72 Senator Schimek says, and then it took effect in '74 I guess, so maybe it was '70. I'm not...but, anyway, it was...it was early. It's been a good number of years ago. If what Senator Bromm suggests is based on the idea that people don't know whether a Governor candidate or nominee of his or her party should be allowed to select a running mate, that's one thing. But if the delay is because we're trying to decide whether we ought to clutter the constitution further, that's another thing and that's totally unacceptable as a reason to bracket the bill. So I would like to ask Senator Bromm a question or two that might bring me some clarification.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Bromm, would you respond?

SENATOR BROMM: Yes, I would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bromm, you had said, I did pay attention to you, I wasn't distracted, that this matter has moved rapidly; that the current way it is expressed may be the best way, the best language to express what we're trying to do, but you might not be completely sure. So here's where I need clarification. Are you not sure that there should be an empowering of the candidate for Governor to select a running mate, or are you unsure whether or not we ought to require in the constitution that the person selected must be a member of the same political party?

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, I'm not totally sold on the first...on the first question that we should change the present
