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method, but I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR BROMM: ...but I'm interested enough in it to move forward and discuss that more. The second question I'm also uneasy with about whether it's a good change in the constitution to allow it to be of any political party, I'm not sure how I feel about that, or how my constituents feel, or what all the ramifications of that are.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bromm, I'm going to continue the discussion with you. What difference does it make what your constituents feel about it, what my constituents feel about it, what anybody's constituents feel about it, I'm talking about that part of where you say you must select somebody of the same party, when the constitution already mandates that at the general election one vote will be cast jointly for the candidate for Governor, the candidate for Lieutenant Governor, and they should be members of the same party? There's no question that that exists at all. We're raising one, but none exists in my mind. So I will ask you...

SENATOR BROMM: Well...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...what question exists with reference to that?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, of course, in the primary election, anyone can throw their name in the hat and try to get themselves in the position of being on the ballot for Lieutenant Governor, and we're eliminating that possibility with this amendment, as I understand it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, that part I would keep separate from the one about putting in the constitution that the one selected must be a member of the same political party. That's what I'm limiting this question to.

SENATOR BROMM: I...oh, I'm sorry, okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Since the constitution already mandates that
