at the general election one vote will be cast jointly for the two and they must be of the same political party, why would we need to make any reference to political affiliation in 14CA?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, right now that vote would always be cast for people of the same political party.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Exactly.

SENATOR BROMM: And...and if we adopt the amendment in its present form, we might be casting a vote for one member of the Republican party and one member of the Libertarian party together.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you...but you can't because that person must be, by the time the election comes around, registered as a member of the same party as the Governor, so...

SENATOR BROMM: You mean with the...with the...with the wording of the amendment right now?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, because the constitution already requires one vote cast jointly for the two, and they are members of the same party.

SENATOR BROMM: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's in the constitution now.

SENATOR BROMM: So they would have to change their registration by the general election to be on the ballot.
