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function. All of that, since this person is running as a standard bearer of his or her party, and that's why I was going into that discussion, is selected because the party believes that this person has ability. I'm sure that whoever the candidate is, is not going to just go out there and grab this mule skinner if the party moguls do not agree. Although the decision will be announced by the candidate, I'm sure that person is going to consult with the power brokers of his or her party.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So those things don't need to be in the constitution. Let them handle those purely partisan matters the way partisan matters ought to be handled, and they should not be put into the constitution.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I guess the only question...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...I'm raising, Senator, is if this were to occur and they weren't of the same party, could they...I think there's a question and I believe they could probably still appear on the ballot as Jane Doe, Democrat, John Jones, Republican.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, that's why I had said earlier, but people don't listen to me very well, that they would have to vote...be members of the same party by the general election, then I added after a pause, maybe, and nobody asked me...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Maybe.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...what I meant by "maybe".

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, and when I got up to ask you about this, you saw my hesitation. I wasn't sure exactly what you had said, but I wanted to clarify it for the record. Thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Schrock, please.
