SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Jensen, if...I was visiting with Senator Landis a little bit ago about the old cigar manufacturers, you know where they used to buy the leaf tobacco and they would roll them. I am sure you can remember back to when those people were still in operation. Are there...you know, is there...are there provisions there where those people will be covered, if there are any; I don't know whether there are any of those people left. There could be in the southeast probably. Do you have any idea what...if there are any of those people?

SENATOR JENSEN: Senator Janssen, I really do not know whether people are still doing that process themselves or not. I don't know of any in the state of Nebraska that are.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, in the bill, it mentions any piece of tobacco that is wrapped in any fashion in any substance would...that will resemble a cigarette or a cigar would be...would be one of those products. And, you know, I'm concerned about that through the rest of the United States, too; of course, what we're worried about is Nebraska right here, but if you get into Florida where there are a lot of the immigrants from, say from Cuba and so on, and that is an art in that...in that country is the cigar manufacture making, and I wonder if they're...I wonder if they're covered. They would be just little independents so some food for thought. Maybe someone with HHS or someone can answer that to me. I would imagine that somewhere in this state there is someone still...still practicing that art of cigar manufacturing. So it'd be interesting to see, and if you would kind of keep your ears open, too. I'd like to see where, you know, where they are at. I know there are people that sell those, sell the cigars, but they buy them from someone who rolls them, which I think...

SENATOR JENSEN: Senator Janssen.
