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in line 26. So on page 2 of the committee amendment, starting in line 23, I want to strike all the language relative to that rebuttable presumption about possession of this container. What does this section that we're talking about here deal with, if you can help me?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Senator, that's an issue that we've been trying to work with these last few days, and we'd be glad to work with you on that issue because it...we've had some other concern with that...with that part of it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, are you willing to strike it for now, and then see if...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...okay.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Yeah, sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, Senator Schellpeper is willing to strike what I am trying to do with my committee amend...with my amendment to the committee amendments, so I will not say anything further at this time. I will listen to see if anybody objects to it, and if not, then we don't have to take much time on this particular amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: For discussion on the Chambers amendment, I will go through the speaking order to see if you want to speak on the Chambers amendment. Senator Landis. Senator Robak, would you like to speak on the Chambers amendment? Senator Brown, on the Chambers amendment? Senator Quandahl, on the Chambers amendment? Senator Quandahl, you're recognized.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Yes, Mr. President, I will just talk briefly on the Chambers amendment and then also the committee amendments as a whole. The current wingspan test that's in there right now was suggested to us because that, as I understand it, is the test that's used by law enforcement agencies and also prosecutors right now, and so that's why and that's where the language came from for the possession or the wingspan test, as it is called, in the committee amendments. That's all I have.
