PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schellpeper.

SENATOR ROBAK: Would this first offense be on their records permanently?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Yes, it would, as long as they're a minor.

SENATOR ROBAK: A minor is under 21, I believe, isn't it?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Right, right.

SENATOR ROBAK: So, 18, that includes anybody under 18 also? Would that be on the record permanently?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Anybody under...as long as they under 21, it would.

SENATOR ROBAK: For...for anybody under 21, their first offense would be on their record permanently.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Till they are 21.

SENATOR ROBAK: And that would prevent them...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Just till they are 21.

SENATOR ROBAK: ...possibly from getting into law school, medical school,...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: No, no, no, no, no.

SENATOR ROBAK: ...military or whatever?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: No, has...has nothing to do with...

SENATOR ROBAK: But they do look at that though. And from getting scholarships, they look at that, too.
