SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: It is no different than current law.

SENATOR ROBAK: Well, then current law is...no, current law you throw the records out at 18. It's you can't, when they're 18,...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: No.

SENATOR ROBAK: ...it goes out the window.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: As long as they are under 21, they are a minor.

SENATOR ROBAK: No, between 18 and 21, there is a difference in the law. There's a big difference between the law under...at 18 and 21 with drinking and drive...with minor in possession, and another question here I have is, if a minor is at a gathering, the way I...and I did hear this bill. I heard the whole thing. It says I was absent, but I heard the whole bill. If a minor is at a gathering and someone brings in alcohol, and I was a little upset, too, that they brought in a whole bunch of school kids, who had no idea of what they were talking about. If a minor is at a gathering and someone brings in alcohol, and the law enforcement comes in, do they all get a minor in possession even though they were not drinking?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Senator, if you would have heard the whole bill,...

SENATOR ROBAK: I heard the whole bill.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: ...then, no, they do not all lose their driver's license.

SENATOR ROBAK: They do not...they do not lose their...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: No.

SENATOR ROBAK: ...they don't get...but do they...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Only if they actually have...minor...if they have alcohol in their blood or if it is in their
