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accept the fact that people who are older shouldn't drink either and, like Senator, I don't...I think if we could stop everybody from drinking it'd be the right thing to do. I, personally, don't drink. That doesn't make me any different than anybody else, except that I don't care for alcohol. But that's not the point. I think what we're trying to do right here right now is something for the youth of this state and I think it behooves us to move ahead and try to put some legislation in place that will, in fact, help young people to understand that drinking and driving or drinking in any instance is not the right thing to do until they reach the age of maturity when they have better judgment, hopefully can have better judgment. With that, I hope that you can see your way clear to pass this bill and make a law that isn't all that much different than what we have, except it puts stronger teeth in it. With that, thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Beutler, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Schellpeper, if I could clarify a few items I would appreciate it. First of all, let me say...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Yes.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Schellpeper.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...thank you for...first of all, let me say thank you for all the hard work. It's obvious that you've tried to negotiate...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I always like easy issues.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...a large number of things here. (Laugh) Let me...let me just explore a couple of things, so I know what the intent of the committee was.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Okay.

SENATOR BEUTLER: With respect to the committee amendments on page 1, it indicates that the State Patrol would be the one doing investigations, and does that mean...does that intend to preclude all the other law enforcement agencies from doing it?
