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Are we saying that they're okay if they just shut their eyes and shut their minds and go ahead and sell the liquor? It seems to me that that's what this guideline requirement seems to be saying; that if you...if the sting person gives you a false identification that that's enough. But if I'm thinking about this clearly, it seems to me it's opening the door to simply ignoring common sense on the part of the retailer and, therefore, it ought...that also ought not to be a part of the guidelines. So two out of the three of the guidelines are, it seems to me, clearly unacceptable, so now you have a third specific mentioned. Maybe we're better off with just guidelines that don't mention anything and let the State Patrol draw them up. Certainly the State Patrol would never put those items into their guidelines because they effectively end all sting operations as soon as people find out how they operate. So I simply point out to you what I consider to be a second inadequacy to this particular section that either needs to be cleaned up or we to eliminate the section. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Schellpeper, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and members. Senator Beutler, what you're saying is that you want them to use false IDs? I guess if I could visit with you a little bit, you say you don't want truthful identification.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Do you want a false identification then?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, Senator, a sting operation, as I see it, is, by its nature, false, not truthful. I mean if it were truthful, you wouldn't be doing it in the first place. You're sending in people who are designed to be untruthful and that's not...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Yeah, but they're...

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...that's not the problem with the sting. The problem...
