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correct, Senator.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: That's right, and...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: ...we'll have to look back at that law, but I'm sure it's in that law because we've discussed it before. Another thing, maybe Senator Chambers wants to strike the whole amendment, I don't think we should strike the whole amendment. On line 17 we could maybe strike 'and truthful responses to the inquiries'. That might be something that we could strike on Select File, but I don't think we should strike the whole amendment in Section 6 because I think the State Patrol needs to be involved in these here stings. We've had time and time...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: ...again, the testimony in the committee stating that that's something that we need to do. I would have no problem striking those five words in section...in...on line 17, Section 6, but I would be opposed to striking the entire amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator. For discussion on the Chambers amendment, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor and members of the Legislature. I've been sitting here listening to the discussion on the amendment, the bill, Senator Chambers' amendments, and I just thought maybe I might...I might stand up and make a few statements for the retailers. No reputable retailer that I know of wants to sell alcoholic beverages to a minor. The risks are just too high. You run the risk of losing your business, your livelihood. No one wants to do that. There are some retailers, I would imagine, that, yes, they'll go to any attempt to make a buck, but I cannot understand anyone sacrificing their license, their business, their reputation, to sell a six-pack of beer. In my opinion, that does not happen. It could happen in some instances but not...not all the time. I might add that, Senator Beutler, false identification are used...are used in some occasions. Young people know how to
