respect to education funding, that we were in fact going to have an automatic mechanism; that the certification that came on state aid to education was going to be the law for the Legislature and we need to fund that amount of money. In a sense, it's putting to one side that amount of money and saying, we're going to use it for this level of education spending. It's almost like a trust fund. It's statutorily set aside. The Legislature, without changing the statute, cannot change the amount of money that's going to be identified as certified and, therefore, as required to go into that pot. The community college law has a similar kind of provision that has at least a requirement in certain instances that we make up certain kinds of differences no matter what. The Highway Trust Fund takes that money out and puts it in a separate pile. There are other things. What we're doing and what we're allowing special interest groups to do over time is to set aside their separate pots, and they each have a separate pot and it's hands off that pot, hands off that pot, and hands off that pot. And as we allow them to create more of these pots, you and I become bound up with a hundred...with a hundred twine, because when there is a necessity for balancing things, we can't reach into this pot, that pot, that pot or that pot. Now with healthcare we're experiencing the policy question of setting up another pot, a huge pot, a million-dollar pot. I mean this isn't like the Environmental Trust where we're talking about five, six, seven million, or the grant program for education where we're talking about five, six, seven million a year. We're talking about a fund that, as you heard earlier in this...in this session, is going to receive, in addition to the 50 million later this year, it's...over the next few years it's going to receive in addition the cigarette tax money, which is pretty much settled it's coming now, that's going to create money in excess of a billion dollars, billion dollars, which will create interest-only expenses or funds available in the neighborhood of a hundred million dollars. Now that's a pretty huge chunk of money that otherwise would have been available to the General Fund. That's a pretty huge amount of money to set aside and say hands off, and it's a really huge amount of money to set aside and say hands off and also, and also some of these things...
