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Senator, was that they were not conducted the same across the entire state. The ones that, basically, are done in most of what I would call rural Nebraska that the State Patrol does, there was no problem, but there currently is no one set of rules that they follow.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, Senator...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: And the retailers thought there should be.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schellpeper, I don't care about what the violators say, I want to ask you a question.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Where do we find the uniform set of rules to determine how they conduct sting operations with reference to enforcement of prostitution laws?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: There isn't any right now.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How about enforcement of drug laws?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: There isn't any of those either.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, why should we treat alcohol differently when it is the most regulated industry in society and the courts have said it can be the most regulated because of the nature of the product and the damage that it can cause? Why should we single out alcohol?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Well, we're really not singling it out. We're just saying with this bill, when you're going to be doing these here stings, the State Patrol and the Liquor Commission will draw up guidelines, is what we're saying, and it's just for something to follow.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schellpeper, would you agree with me that there are not nearly as many of these operations conducted in rural areas as would be the case in a thickly populated area, such as Omaha or Lincoln?
