SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if you strike the language that I'm trying to strike, it doesn't take away...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: What...what are you...what are you attempting to strike with this amendment, Senator?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, if you look...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I was talking to counsel and I wasn't following.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that's, because that hit me when I was supposed to be looking at one of yours. In line 15, starting with the word "Such", I would strike that entire sentence that ends in line 18. I think when Senator Schellpeper sees what I'm doing, he will agree with it.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I see what you're trying to do. There's already guidelines.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: See, what...what will be left, and since these things are coming at you and you have to defend against them, you may not be looking at it in the way that I am, so I am going to tell you what would still be left: The Nebraska State Patrol shall maintain records of such compliance checks, and so forth. So that means the recordkeeping is going to be left alone. That's what comes after. Now what comes before it is this: Such compliance checks shall be conducted pursuant to guidelines adopted and promulgated by the Nebraska State Patrol with input from the commission. The language authorizing them to draft these guidelines would be untouched. So if they're going to draft the guidelines, why do we need to put this into the statute, and to help you with an answer, let me ask you a question or two. Would you respond?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Sure, I'd be glad to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think their guidelines would require that the person, who is going to participate in this sting, present an appearance which is consistent with the person's true
