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will say, well, not really. But at least they may not find the fault they could find if you tell them one thing and you do something else. I read this morning in the paper where a young girl put a seven-foot letter A in the front yard where she and her mother live and covered it with red blossoms that had died, and there was a strobe light on it, and it was to be the scarlet letter that represented adultery because her father had moved in to shack up with another woman before they were divorced. This is what a child did. She got the idea, naturally, from Nathaniel Hawthorne's "The Scarlet Letter". So her education was put to practical application. Now the daddy might tell her, honey, your mother and I didn't get along; you shouldn't do that to me. And that, obviously, would not work with the daughter because maybe daddy had told her what marriage ought to be about, and his conduct strayed so far from that that it became necessary for her to express her opinion about what he had done. You have this guy named Barr from Alabama or wherever he comes from, who brings these bills that says marriage should be between a man and a woman and that's to protect marriage, yet you need to protect it from people like him who has had multiple divorces and multiple marriages. That's the one you need to protect marriage from, those who do marry a woman, and then will kick her aside. And Newton Gingrich, when his wife was sick, sick abed in the hospital, dumped her like an old sock to go for somebody else. Do you know what old Strom Thurmond said, Senator Redfield, when he was 116 years old and he looked out there at that 22-year-old fox and decided he wanted to marry her, and people said, what does an old geezer like you marrying a young fox like that for? He was at least honest, he said, I'd rather smell perfume than liniment. So he kept a bit of wit about his old self. To bring it back to what this bill deals with is a war against our children. All of this stuff about taking their licenses should be taken out of this bill.

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They have no business being placed in a bill where you're talking about these miscreants who are violating the law and their liquor license requirements by selling to these young people. I have heard these liquor dealers and their lobbyists saying, well, you got to punish these kids, you got to stop them from doing it. That's not the approach I take. I say
