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SENATOR CHAMBERS: How successful do you think a football team would be if every time it ran the play it was the same play run the same way?

SENATOR BOURNE: Not very successful.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And suppose you had a conference consisting of 12 schools, and you said that the commissioner is going to have to sit down and lay out a plan by which every team is going to have to run every play the same way, how successful do you think that conference would be?

SENATOR BOURNE: Not very successful.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are those who play football and coach football brain surgeons?

SENATOR BOURNE: Not quite, but I think close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are they rocket scientists?

SENATOR BOURNE: Again, not quite, but close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How long do you think it would take those who are going to play against teams in this conference to realize that they run the same play the same way every time they run it?

SENATOR BOURNE: Um, soon.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Members of the Legislature, you're talking about protecting law violators. You are not talking in these committee amendments, I am not going to call Senator Wehrbein "Squire" this morning because he is very serious and I don't want him to think that I am trivializing the questions that he asked. But, Senator Wehrbein, this amendment is being sought by the law violators, not by the public, and the lobbyists work on that committee all the time. People knew in the old days when they fought the British how they were going to fight them, and they didn't just wear bright colored clothes so they'd make easy targets.
