remember, that was a significant error. And so you don't know how many times those kinds of significant errors will happen.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, thank you. Now, it is the case, I believe, that there are currently available procedures for dealing with these errors. The problem is that these errors are corrected one year hence. And I think that would be the case...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: One minute.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...for both. In the case of a clerical error, the respin, or excuse me, the audit would be the...would be the manner in which that's corrected. In the case of special education, then the payments that...the reimbursement, in effect, is one year hence. Am I correct on that?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. Now, this bill would call for three years, rather than one year. So, in effect, there is an inconsistency between what this bill would do and what the current regulations would provide for, I believe. Is that correct?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Well, in the area of special ed, though, you'd still...you would have...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Time.
