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why we address this fund as a hardship fund. I know that I was informed, from one of my schools in the district this year, in December, before the session began, that there was a clerical error of \$70,000. And the CPA had actually made the error, and he was very upset that this happened because of the impact that it might have on the school. And I think that that's what we're just trying to address, that sometime...I mean we are human and errors are made, and that we need some kind of fund. And I'm not saying that we actually need the 2.7, but this was left over from the other Mitigation Fund. But we do need an amount to address those concerns. The size of the error depends very much sometimes the impact on the school, because if you have a smaller budget and you have a larger error, of course, it's going to greatly impact that school. I just know I have before me, and we have mentioned before that Hebron Public Schools, there was a clerical error of 243,000 in that school. And they had to wait one year before that could be corrected. Hebron is not that large of a school. And I'm sure that they used some reserves or something, but this may not always be possible. Davenport, there was another clerical error of about 66,000. So I believe that we have set the rules quite tight as far as there has to be a concern and unavoidable, something that schools were not expecting, and it has to go through a committee, and then indirectly then, or directly the Commissioner of Education will make that decision. So I am support...am supporting the committee amendments. I think that this is certainly a fund that is needed, just because there are errors and situations that schools are not planning on that do happen. So, thank you.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Mr. President, members. I failed to point out that we do have a handout and a bullet sheet that explains most of it to you. If you turn that over, on the backside, we have shown where the...a page off of the budget sheets from the Appropriations Committee that shows that, in effect, there was 2.7 that was not appropriated from the Mitigation Funds last year. That is not to say that that wouldn't be a new appropriation this year, but it is an attempt in recognizing last year to give some assistance. Not all of that...not that much was really done. And I, at that time a number of us were saying that we thought the bill last year missed the target.
