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handed to me, and we discussed it for prioritizing, and as we all know we don't like to throw away our priority bill; we like to have something that's substantial and for a reason and that's going to benefit everybody, not just one or two people. And what really got me on this bill was the fact that it's not a give-away, it's not a program we're going to get here and give people money and not expect something back for it. And, if they can pay it back, or if it's...if they are reimbursed, such as was alluded to, have a roof blow off and the insurance company covers that, they will have to make up those dollars. The insurance company may not pay off that moment, but they will eventually. And, if they do eventually, then it has to be paid back. And so there's a lot of safeguards in here. I've never seen a bill with so many safeguards in it. I mean, we are right down to the bottom here and everything has checked out. And, if all else fails, then this body does the rest, the Education Committee and the Governor, and there's just a lot of safeguards in it. One more thing, we've all gone around to our districts and territory, and I've heard the Governor say he's for our smaller schools and to keep our schools going, and if there's a reason to have them merge and so on, fine. But it shouldn't be for a reason that's out of their control. And with all the safeguards, I just think it's a bill that we can all live with here and support it. And I appreciate your...all your comments. And I appreciate Senator Raikes' concerns. And if he has something that Senator Bohlke can work with to make the bill even better, why appreciate that, too. Thank you. I'll give a minute or so here to Senator Jones, if he'd like it.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Senator Jones.

SENATOR JONES: Thanks, Senator Cudaback. I just wanted to stand in strong support of this bill, because I can see how it would really help me, because you never know when a family would move in, you know, with...maybe a lot of them that's on special ed and they need help, and that special ed money wouldn't come until the next year, or if they have a big expense. There was a school, I don't know how many of you knew it, but a country school by the name of Birdwood, burned down, just burned down the other day. And they're hauling the kids to, splitting them up between Sutherland and Hershey, trying to get them to school for the rest of the year. But I don't know whether they're
