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but this bill does put some burden on the solicitor to show that they complied with these proper procedures, rather than putting the burden on the consumer and that's where in the past a lot of times, you're right, one person's word against another. So this makes the solicitor prove that they did it in a proper manner in accordance with the act. Otherwise, they're in violation.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Thank you. That helps.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Time. Senator Crosby, you're light is next on the Beutler amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you very much, Mr. President. Senator Beutler, yes, as we told you, we think it's a good amendment, and I do appreciate the fact that you're going to pull it this morning and let us look at it between now and Select File, and one of my big reasons, I wanted to be sure the Direct Marketing Association, who has, as I said before, has helped us so much on this bill, I want to be sure that they feel good about it. So we will work with you. Some questions have been raised that I might as well just add in here. Part of this bill is education, because the people who want the bill and who worked so hard to get it to this stage and this point, the AARP, the TRIAD, the Agency on Aging, all of those people work and send out in their newsletters, they post them on bulletin boards all the rules and this new bill will bring them a new dimension to help people to resist the people that call them and try to con them into giving them money and not getting anything in return for it. So I think that those protections and the fact that we do have something now in place will discourage some of the calls, I hope, but also that when you do have...you have recourse, as Senator Bromm said, to call the Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General, they can call the Agency on Aging, go to the senior center, those places. Someone will help them. And most of these people, so many of these people are on fixed income. They cannot afford to lose that money, so the fact that, as Senator Wehrbein says, it's hardly worth hiring a lawyer to recover a thousand dollars, but there are people out there, the Attorney General's Office and the Commission on Aging, all of those people are advocates and people who will help someone who's in trouble and who needs that money back. At least, even if they don't get the money back, as we start using
