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for judges' salaries, things like that. But one of the biggest surprises I would say, maybe it's not a surprise now, but last week with the low-level nuclear waste issue where we're getting it requested for 6 to 9 million dollars for General Funds to replace those frozen funds. Now we're not going to know until April 10th, but with the wording that many of you know about that's in that court decree, it would be questionable I think but what...if we're going to continue paying our bills and preparing a defense, if that's what it takes, it's going to take some General Fund money. So you add that all up with many of the bills that have already gone through here, and I don't have a master list, in about ten days we will have probably a list, or maybe three weeks, of all the A bills, but you can add those up yourself as to the spending bills that we've done. And they run from 300,000 to 500,000 to 700,000 to a million dollars and more. This one's \$9 million. This wipes out nearly all of the money that's allocated for A bills. What you want to do I don't know. I know that many do want to do something in the homestead exemption. Really, all I'm here to say is it's starting to get time to do priorities in your own mind as to what you want and maybe it means reading the board to see what kind of level support there are for homestead exemptions, or perhaps respite care. As you know, I've got a bracket on the respite care bill. That is going to be intensively lobbied if I take that bracket off because I certainly am getting intensively lobbied on that particular issue. It's a good cause. It will save money down the road perhaps, as so many of our issues do. Even this case can be made for homestead exemptions about not pricing their people, all of us, eventually out of our homes because of excessive taxes, or at least high when you don't have the income to pay for them. But somewhere along the line we're going to have to draw the line and not let the Governor do it all, because I think we're heading for multimillion dollars in cuts or potential vetoes if we are to hold the line at all. And remember we're not going to be able to go with a 4 percent. I guess I think if I read the sense of the body on the resolution, it was probably 3.5 percent. We're well beyond that right now. But we're going to have to stop at 4 or so if we...if we are to keep within our revenue. So I don't really have the answers except it's time I think in each one of our own mind, I don't mean to be preachy, but to somewhere draw the line on what we can afford to do without leaving all these decisions for the
