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houses plus...plus it does have the issue that Senator Peterson spoke to. They're both in this amendment, is that correct?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: In...they're...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: And could...go ahead.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yeah, there are three issues in this portion of the amendment. One is a raising of the maximum value of a home that qualifies. If you have a mansion you don't qualify, even if you have low income.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Then it changes the value of the home that qualifies underneath that maximum, and then it also changes the definition of the disability that qualifies.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. I would be interested in sorting that out. Do you have the figures on each one of those issues so that...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Well...okay, now again we don't have the fiscal note numbers because those result in an averaging. As Senator Peterson indicated, we did have a fiscal note on LB 301 and that is the disability portion. That was indicated in the fiscal note to be 700...well, it'd be 751,000 in the year 2000, because this bill was...is designed to be effective in the year 2000. That is a lower number than what I think Senator Beutler has been using, because he has, I think, a sheet dated March 10th that comes exclusively from the Department of Revenue, so it hasn't gone through the full fiscal averaging estimating processes. The information that I have and I think that Senator Beutler has from the Department of Revenue indicates that that change costs \$1,764,476 as opposed to the \$751,000 that you'd see in the fiscal note. I'm assuming that if the amendments are adopted, well, I know that we will, see a new fiscal note, and if there's necessary to have any reconciliation between the fiscal note that was for (LB) 301 and the amendment that is now being proposed, I'm sure that that explanation will be offered. I don't know what the reason for the differential is, but the language that's in the bill
