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concerning disabilities is no different than the language in (LB) 301...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: ...and for (LB) 301 we had a fiscal note of roughly 7.5 million...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: ...in the year 2000.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I didn't have the privilege of hearing the testimony on (LB) 301. I wasn't aware...you've put two or three bills in this one bill, is that correct?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: There are...there were two bills combined, LB 301 and LB 745 that Senator Raikes had introduced on behalf of the Governor. Those bills were combined into 179.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Thank you. It would be my thought, at this point, I don't know how the best way to arrive at it, perhaps it will be at Select File, I would not be inclined to do much more. If the issue of disabilities is an issue, I would like to discuss that separately. I, Senator Coordsen probably was right that we should have divided it. I thank Senator Beutler for doing this. But I am reluctant to expand much beyond where we're at right now. If there's a reason to do it on the disabilities, I'd be interested to hear that on...in the debate. But somewhere we have to draw a line that's reasonable and my point at this time, that we have drawn a reasonable line with the income. The valuation issue maybe needs to be tuned some more. I don't know. I don't think it needs to go to the extent it does. I'm interested and open to that debate. The disability issue certainly perhaps we should discuss, 'cause I haven't had the benefit of that debate or the hearing.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: And I think Senator Hartnett's right, we have to recognize that, because we have the respite bill that, even though it's not the same issue, it's related, and that is an
