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SENATOR BROMM: Thank you very much, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. I had filed the bracket the other day, just before, I think, we adjourned or the bill went off the agenda, and so we had no opportunity to really discuss it, although I made sure Senator Baker knew that I filed it so that he'd have an opportunity, and he's had plenty of opportunity now certainly to think about it. Let me describe what my rationale is for bracketing. I don't necessarily disagree with Senator Baker's argument that we could do something different in child support with respect to the factor of depreciation. The language or the guideline in the child support criteria for depreciation may not be fair in all instances. On the other hand, the guidelines for child support...for setting child support are a set of...a set of book...it's a booklet, actually, and I had one here the other day when I filed the motion and it's...it's gotten away from me somehow. But it is a thick booklet of factors that are looked at in child support. Depreciation is only one of the factors that are taken into account in one way or another. If the Legislature is going to get into the nuts and bolts of the child support guidelines, then I think we should be prepared to deal on this floor with many other factors. The income factors of a parent who now has three more children that he had after the obligation of the first child, that's a sore subject, I can tell you that. A number of other considerations can be brought to bear. If we want to get into setting the guidelines on this floor, then we should be prepared to deal with more than just one factor. Secondly, Senator Crosby has a bill, LB 407, which recognizes that we need to do something different with respect to our child support guidelines, but it doesn't say what the answer is. It establishes a group of people, including a couple of Supreme Court judges and economists, who will look at the guidelines right away and continue to look at them on an ongoing basis with an eye towards making them more fair and appropriate. And the way that you establish child support guidelines is a very important process because, even though it's just a presumption and a court can establish a different child support level if it finds good reason to, the burden of proof is really on those who try to convince the court that the guidelines should not be followed. So it's important that the guidelines be fair to both sides. Now, the other...the other concern I have about this bill, I've had a couple of letters and phone
