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calls in the last week from attorneys who are handling divorce cases right now and they're asking me, is this bill going to pass, or is this bill not going to pass? Now, why would they care? I can tell you why they would care. Because if I'm counseling someone who's going to be going through a divorce and if...if I can treat depreciation in the manner that Senator Baker's bill suggests that I can treat it, I can impact what the court is going to require me to pay for child support with just a little quick planning and advice from my attorney, and I can tell you that is going to happen. That is going to happen because that would only be good legal advice, to take advantage of something like this. I do very much agree with Senator Crosby's approach in LB 407. I have been concerned about the child support guidelines for at least three or four years. I have tried to get the State Court Administrator's Office to lead, to provide some leadership in re-looking and revamping the guidelines, and that has not worked and there is a sense of frustration amongst many of us who have tried to deal with this subject. But even though I am frustrated and even though I know there should be changes, I'm not willing to rush to a solution in one aspect of the guidelines as Senator Baker's bill would have us do. And the reason for the bracket motion, besides what I've said, is that we will know before that time whether or not Senator Crosby's bill passes, And if Senator Crosby's bill passes, I suggest to you that we let that process work rather than trying to come in and single out a particular factor and inject our judgment without knowing all of the other elements in the formula for child support guidelines that should also be dealt with. I am...I am serious about the bracket motion. I do intend to take it to a vote at this time and, with that, well, I kept looking for Senator Crosby. I now see where...I now see where she's at, so I won't be able to ask her any questions, but I would encourage the body to really consider the bracket motion at this time. Thank you.
