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court and the courts are going to make the determination of what those orders are. And there has been great strides made to make more uniform child support. These are guidelines. If someone feels that there's inequity, there is the route of appeal. That is used frequently. Child support is one of the most frequently appealed issues and most of it relates to the fact is I don't want to pay it, it's too high. This is not a tax issue. This bill did not arise out of the Revenue Committee. It arose out of the Judiciary Committee. It is not a tax issue. This is an issue about how we are going to determine the available amount of money to pay your first obligation, and that is to support your children. I had great reservations about Senator Crosby's bill. After examining this, I now plan to vote for Senator Crosby's bill to have a study and look at all the pieces and not just take one part at a time. I will not put the amendment in to delay this because, if we'd pass this bill, Senator Crosby's bill could directly have the recommendation the opposite way and we'll wind up reversing ourself, and what's the result? I got to tell you, if this bill passes every lawyer, including myself, I'm going to write a letter to every divorce client that I have and I'm going to say the rules have changed. You now have the opportunity to modify your case to come back in and change your child support. The courts again will be flooded and for what may be a two-year change or a three-year change the damage to the system is too high. And I don't think it's...I don't think that it's the right thing to do. If you're going to change the system, look at all of it. Do it in a comprehensive manner and then make those changes if you don't like them. But I...I think the bracket motion gives us the opportunity to put it off. That's better than killing the bill and having him have to start the process all over. The bracket motion keeps the bill on General...keeps it on Select File, actually, which is well down the track. And if Senator Crosby's study group comes back, makes a quick determination, or if they have a long-term plan or goal, I think we ought to follow that. I'm not going to say I'm going to buy in to what the recommendations are till I see them, but it provides a comprehensive approach. I would hope that we would look at this. The direct result is going to be a lot more modifications in the court system for a change. You can't just make it prospectively. It will happen retrospectively as well and I think that that's an unintended circumstance that we ought to avoid.
