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done as well as she has did in the past, then I think in the future everything is going to be very, very rosy. Now, Senator Baker, who sits in front of me, has impressed upon my mind the fact that his former school teacher caused him to pay a lot of attention to grammar. And I told him that from now on I will not refer to him as a grammarian, because that makes some people think of grandma, so he's the "gramperin" in the culture corner. But I have yet to have him correct me when I use the language incorrectly. When I obviously do it, he will sit there like a bump on a log and just let things go along and not do what ought to be done. But since I see that his light is on this morning, I think we may see him hold forth in a way that he has been negligent about in the past. But getting to this particular nomination, the Parole Board, in recent times, has been very reluctant to parole people. Some of them have become very gun shy and have adopted the attitude, in my mind, of thinking that they must be infallible predictors of the future. And because of the possibility that they may misread a particular person who is to be paroled, and that parolee may make a mistake. They are erring on the side of not functioning as the Parole Board ought to function, that is my opinion. I'm hoping that with the elevation to the chairmanship, chairpersonship of the Parole Board of this nominee that we can see some modification in that approach. We all know that nobody is going to be able to tell, even tomorrow, what one of us is going to do. We can speculate and say what one of us may seem likely to do, based on past performances, but we're not absolutely certain. We're not held to that standard of certitude, nor is anybody else. So, with those few comments, I'm going to enthusiastically vote in support of this nomination.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion. Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Mr. Chairman, members of the body, thank you. For Senator Chambers' information, I'm a freshman and I'm learning. But let me tell you I have a list of these grammarian type errors and so on. Linda Krutz, from McCook, I've known her, who she is. She's very able, qualified and experienced. She has an impeccable record and she's dedicated to her job there in southwest Nebraska, and she'll be a great person in this position. So I certainly support her. Thank you.
