PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you have a little less than three minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Crosby, for the questions. I know where they came from, and I'm glad that they're being raised now, because the questions don't really involve Lancaster County. And here's why I say it, Gary Lacey, the County Attorney in Lancaster County, asked that a special prosecutor be appointed, asked that the State Patrol do the investigating. This is coming from another group who are raising what I consider to be false flags to create the appearance that there's an issue here which there is not. There is not going to be a situation where large numbers of people from any other jurisdiction will be called. First of all, the whole team that will be appointed by the special prosecutor will consist of three people. They will not all come from the same police agency. So I don't see where those who pose that question, I don't mean Senator Crosby now, are talking about the reduction in force or available people to operate on their particular agency, if one of their members is asked, by the special prosecutor, to serve on this team. This is what should be kept in mind--the police agencies know about this amendment. One of the letters that I submitted to you all in that package is from the umbrella organization that represents the police agencies all over the state. They agree with the amendment. The amendment was worked out in conjunction with law enforcement people, the ones who are going to be involved. It is not the police who are raising this issue.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There might be one particular county attorney who doesn't want his name brought forth because of some problems he has had and the way he has handled grand juries, and that one is not Gary Lacey, by the way. So, in answering specifically about the cost of a grand jury, the county where the grand jury is impaneled pays the cost of the grand jury. That's the way it is now. The only difference is that in a killing, under the circumstances covered by the law that we're discussing, a special prosecutor would be appointed. However, if it's one of those natural deaths which occurs in a detention facility, and a
