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SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. And what was...what was...what is current law with regard to how the investigation would be conducted right now?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There is...there is nothing in way of a restriction or a guideline. And, as I pointed out, Gary Lacey, the Lancaster County Attorney, has asked for the appointment of a special prosecutor and that the State Patrol do the investigating. So, jurisdictions can, I shouldn't use that term. Well, I don't want to confuse the issue. But the county attorney is free to do these things anyway, and Gary Lacey has done such things.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So, if there's a special prosecutor, and he selects his team of three, is it...is it your idea that this team of three would charge the jurisdiction for their services?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's an interesting question. My view would be, at first blush, no, in the same way that I don't believe the State Patrol charges Lancaster County. And in some cases the Chief of Police from Omaha had indicated that they have invited officers from other areas into Omaha, but they were not paid for coming there by Omaha.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Let me approach that question from a little different angle, for a better understanding of it also. With respect to those officers who are invited to participate as part of the team, what if you get back-biting within the system and they refuse to participate?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, from what was said by the law enforcement persons testifying on this, that wouldn't be the problem. They didn't foresee any problem, and they have talked about these...these different conglomerations of law enforcement people who worked together in teams already, and that doesn't seem to be a problem. See, you wouldn't...you wouldn't compel an officer, who didn't want to...
