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and then, in a conjunctive, investigate the matter as in any other homicide. The implication from the use of the conjunctive is that secure the scene and preserve all evidence is something in addition to investigate the matter as in any other homicide. I would have thought that those are primary practices in the investigation of a homicide, not something in addition to the investigation of a homicide. If they are something in addition to the investigation of a homicide, we should know what they are. And in fact the first thought that flashed through my mind, and, Senator Chambers, I recognize that this is a ridiculous flash, but my thought was, does that mean that you have to leave the body in place? Is the way you preserve evidence, in some way, in addition to the way that you would normally do that in a homicide investigation? Now, Senator, I realize it is preposterous to assume that someone wants or should keep a body in place as a way of preserving all evidence. But what does preserve all evidence, in addition to the language "investigate the matter as any other homicide" mean? The issue.... I think there's also another issue that arises because of the treatment of deaths that are due presumably to natural causes, and then the presenting of that finding to a grand jury. And, Senator Chambers, I think...I'm really unfamiliar with this area of the statutes. And if you want to advise me what the processes are, I'll be happy to hear about that. In subsection (d) it says that, a special prosecutor need not be appointed when a licensed practicing physician certifies the death to be natural causes, and that finding is presented to a grand jury. My question is, what happens if the grand jury doesn't believe the certification from the officer or from the physician? At that point do you have a special prosecutor appointed? Does the grand jury continue its own investigation? And why, if a physician certifies the death to be from natural causes, why is there any...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: ...additional process at that point? Because I assume that there isn't an anticipation that the grand jury will be a rubber stamp of that decision by the physician. But what do they do? Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wickersham, every question you've
