There's a grocery store I go to on the way home because it's near the highway, and as you come off going up L Street, that won't mean anything to most people, near 108th, there is a great big billboard with lights that flash to catch your attention, and I am surprised they haven't had more accidents there, Senator Redfield and Senator Suttle. That would really be Pandora's box. But they flash up there how many millions of dollars are available. All you got to do is buy the ticket. Then when I go into Albertson's, what do I see? I am going up there to get a money order to pay off my little bills, and pay for the books that I purchase, which I really shouldn't, but I have an addiction for books. My student, Tyson, understands this, "Baron" Tyson. They will sell these lottery tickets.
