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SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...is to permanently cripple and disadvantage certain classes or categories of children while advantaging others, and that is a terrible thing for an education system to acknowledge. But the worst thing of all is that the acknowledgement does not generate any outrage among those who make up the majority people. So the majority people had better realize that what is happening now cannot continue to go on unopposed.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Dierks, on the bracket motion.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Madam President and members of the Legislature. I wonder if I could ask Senator Bohlke a question, please.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Bohlke, will you yield?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes.

SENATOR DIERKS: Senator Bohlke, can you tell me or do you know somebody on the floor that could tell me what it costs now per year to send a student to the University of Nebraska?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Well, just for tuition, not room and board, or just generally? No, I can't. (Laugh) I could give a...I saw those. I really don't...I couldn't give you an accurate answer as to room and board, books, tuition. I'm guessing we're talking about maybe eight or nine thousand dollars. I know that it's lower than what people generally believe; that the university has told me that people believe it's a much higher cost, and I believe I saw the number eight to nine thousand dollars.

SENATOR DIERKS: Okay. Thank you. I heard something the other day on one of the radio stations I was listening to that the cost of attending college at Harvard is over \$40,000 a year now. Those type of costs pretty soon take us common folks out of the business of sending our kids to college. You know, we've done a great job, Senator Beutler mentioned that, with the community colleges and their ability to teach people trades. I think that one of the other great things we've done, and this happened a
