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list? You know, it goes one through, I think, one through six. Also, on the next page, Section 7 deals with a follow-up program to see...kind of test accountability. It's, you know, for one year, three years, five years, and so forth. And I don't know, does the State Department of Education do...have an evaluation like this for other...other programs? And every school district, if I understood you right, Senator Stuhr, that every school district would get these funds, regardless? I think in my local district they work at cooperative relations with...with the...with the community college. And so I think.... I don't know whether they even have a vocational program. But they would still qualify, as I understand it. So maybe if you could respond to those questions, Senator Stuhr, I would appreciate it.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Sen...

SENATOR STUHR: Let me respond that on page 4, as I indicated before, the teachers and those involved in these programs listed them in that order because of the importance that they felt and the need. And they do begin with equipment and professional development, and then also improvement of career guidance and counseling activities. Those were the...the need that was felt by the most schools. Answering your question in regards to the State Department of Education, right now they do not have an accountability system. They are not reporting these numbers. So this is something that as a member of the Education Committee, we have been asking for a material background. Do they have the facts? Do they have the figures? And this would allow them then to have this accountability and evaluation system that has not been held previously. Your other question relating to would all schools? To receive a grant the school must apply for it, and they must have an approved program in career preparation area. So they must make an application. Does.... I hope that answers your questions.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Could I ask you another question, Senator Stuhr?

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Stuhr, one more question.
