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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That...that, unless they had planned for it in some other way, which I would think that they could do if they were inclined to do it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you and I know that they won't do that, don't we? We're pretty sure they will not do that (inaudible).

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, can I take just one...I mean maybe they could purchase a lathe to learn some milling for steel. That would be a one-time machine purpose and I wouldn't think that the instructor for that would have to be a problem for paying him in the future. For example, that could be an additional duty for a teacher.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, other than an outlay for a piece of machinery, if they thought these programs were worthwhile why won't they pay for them right now on their own?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, I concur that that is an option that I think school districts should be doing to some degree, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you very much. Members of the Legislature, any program, I'm saying program, that is relying on these lottery funds will come to an end very shortly because this bill, as amended, makes a one-time give away. I don't believe these schools are going to carry on anything, and I don't believe that Senator Stuhr will stand on this floor and say they'll carry it on because they think it's important. If they thought it was important, Senator Smith, they'd be doing it now, wouldn't they? They don't think it's important to do now, they're not going to think it's important enough to carry on. So this is just a feel good, throw away piece of money. Let me ask Senator Stuhr a question, if I may, 'cause I'm going to get political now and I know that in a polit...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in a political body you should never inject politics, but I'm going to cross the line. Senator Stuhr, are you pretty sure the government will...the Governor will sign this bill as it exist now with the one-time throw
