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would need mentoring, because Wally was the son, Ward was the husband. (Laughter.)

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I would stand in support of Senator Bruning's argument. And I would like to further another argument. And Senator Stuhr has actually alluded to it. The fact is that vocational education is most effective when we bring business people into the partnership. And people, as they mentor and share the responsibilities of their profession, their vocation with students, are very, very effective. Mentoring is not about just taking you to a football game, it's about sharing your vocation and all of the steps necessary to achieve your goals in life. And therefore, I believe that mentoring is extremely germane to vocational education programs. Certainly we can see that responsibility can be built within the students as they work with a mentor, that a mentor can be sharing with them how exactly to go about filling out a resume, dressing for a job, learning the responsibilities of being on time, the values of hard work and honesty in the workplace. Certainly, even the skills that they occupy in the workplace are shared in a mentoring situation. So I would ask you to entertain the thought that in fact mentoring is very much a part of vocational education.
