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\$3 million. And in fact if she'll accept that amount, we will not appropriate anything. I will give her... Senator Stuhr, if you'll accept my next amendment, I will give you that amount out of my pocket right now. We don't have to go through the amending or appropriation process. That amount will be \$2.37. So I want you to think about that. Since you are willing to leave language that says "up to \$3,200,000", and the Squire and I have established, through our conversation, that that can be any amount, \$3,200,000 or less, I will start with a lesser amount. And then see if we can work our way from there to the amount you think we ought to specifically appropriate. However, if you're willing to accept the beginning bid of \$2.37, I will give that to you now, to be spent any way that you choose, no strings attached. Senator Stuhr, let me ask you this question, if you will yield. What did the people in Fiscal tell you would be the problem if we did not make this one of those fluid or indefinite amounts and just put into the bill \$3,200,000? What problem did they tell you that would create?

SENATOR STUHR: I'm not sure. Let... I need to do some conferring and get back to you, if you would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If they cannot tell you a problem, do you see a problem with putting that specific amount...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in the bill?

SENATOR STUHR: Personally, no, I don't.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, that's all I'm asking. And even though I don't like the bill and don't want to see it passed, I don't see anything wrong with that. Let me ask Senator Bohlke a question, 'cause she knows everything.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bohlke, what can happen... Let's say this amendment I'm offering here now fails. What could
