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I think that it's interesting and appropriate and desirable that we all recognize that one of the functions and one of the proper functions of government is to periodically address the economic system, and to bring that system into some kind of socially acceptable form. Because we all know that the capitalist system, as wonderful as it is, has a tendency towards monopoly. It has historically been true, it has always been true, it is the natural thing to happen, if you let go of the system completely, if government doesn't intervene on behalf of all the participants in the system. And so, historically, from time to time, we have intervened. We intervened with the railroads on behalf of the farmers, a long, long time ago. And I think it's entirely appropriate, if the farm community understand that consolidation is hurting the interests of the independent producer in ways that are not recognized as true and fair competition, that they enlist the power of government to act on their behalf. And I'm glad they're doing so. And, Senator Dierks, your penalty provisions relating to refusal to report information, I think, should be extended to the reporting of false information. And I think that should be a crime and a civil penalty pertain to that also. And I would just encourage you to move forward and do everything possible, because I think that the pressure that's being put on producers in these last couple of decades has led to a lot of other unfortunate consequences, especially as it relates to things that I'm interested in, and in particular the protection of the environment. I think farmers are some of the greatest environmentalists, I truly do. And there are probably more of them, proportionately, than there are in the urban populations. But it's very, very difficult for them to do the right thing with regard to the environment, with this constant pressure, constant price pressure that is there. And the people in the farm community would know better than I whether that pressure...to what extent that pressure extends from a truly competitive system, and to what extent that pressure is artificial and imposed by consolidated packer and grain purchaser pressure. So, I hope this bill has a beneficial influence, and I hope we can move to the situation where the market is indeed free and is perceived as free, and is in fact free. Thank you.
