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That's the bottom line and that's exactly what the situation is today. And with no more intelligence than I have, I can understand that. If you don't...if it costs you more to produce than you get for it, you're not going to make any money, and if you don't make any money, the bottom line then is, and Ernie says that's a bad word, but the bottom line is you're going to go broke, simple as that. Senator Dierks has spoke to that. If you're in that industry, if you're a producer of those products and you lose money, eventually you're going to be out of business unless you can get in a big inheritance somewhere, but you're not going to stay in business. And the purpose, I think, of this body is to make sure, in the best way that they can, whatever it takes to do, is to make sure that production agriculture in this state doesn't go broke. Unfortunately, today that is exactly what is happening. You see the young people in this country who don't go into agriculture simply because there isn't any money to be made and everybody has to make a living. Everybody has to eat. Everybody has to have some of the things that they feel they are entitled to and which they should be. So the reason I'm supportive of the bill, I think this is at least a step in the direction to try to correct some of the inequities that have developed in the system. I am not here to beat up on the industry that processes the products. We're just here asking them to be more fair and to try to understand the problems that production agriculture has in America today, particularly in the Midwest where it's the biggest source of the income for many of the people in this state and in the Midwest. So with those few words, I just want you to know that I support the advancement of this bill, hope that we can work out enough differences, if there are those that develop, and we come to an understanding that will, in fact, do something for the agriculture producers of America. With that, than you very much, Mr. Lieutenant Governor.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. For further discussion, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, I would like to resume my discussion with Senator Raikes. Even though Senator Vrtiska pretends that it's above his head, I'm going to try to bring it closer to earth.
