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But we're not trying to make this an ideal world. We're not trying to, and it's just a situation that needs to be talked about, and I'm glad we're talking about it. What's wrong with this? I think Senator Chambers said the other day if you can't talk about a situation why it's not worth here...being here, and that...that's the truth. The more discussion you can get the better, and I think the more we can talk about this here, why not. You know, it's our future. The average age of a farmer 15 years ago was about, what, 37 or 8. Do you know what it is now? It's about 58 or 9. Yeah, almost as young as you are, Senator Chambers, and so that's a bad situation. What's going to happen in another 10 years? Will it keep going? If it keeps going, it's going to be as old as some of us in here in another year, a year every year. Can't do this. So we make kind of light of this and maybe that's all right. It gets attention, and I think we're going to get the attention of the people in the east. And so be it, that's what it should be. We're not blaming anybody, but let's get the attention, let's get this wrapped up. That swing swings too high, we're going to fall out and I don't want that to be me. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Preister.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President. I rise in support of Senator Dierks' bill and the advancement of it. I think Senator Dierks has worked tirelessly on the issue and on lots of issues that affect the people in his district and around the rest of the state. In rising in that support, I would like to ask Senator Chambers a couple of questions, if I may, please.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, would you yield.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR PREISTER: Senator Chambers, in your graphic illustrations of iron, I was just wondering, since we're dealing with agriculture here, if you were referring to pig iron?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I can't give a better answer than the question that was asked.
