amendment amends the definition of peace officer, to strike language that limits the Game and Parks Commission conservation officers within such definition. The second amendment changes the application fee to be charged under the act from \$75 to \$100. That improves the fiscal impact of the bill. The amendment also changes procedures for involvement of law enforcement in the application process. Specifically, the committee amendment would require that the application be not only to the county sheriff and, if applicable, to the chief municipal law enforcement officer of the applicant's place of residence, but also forwarded to the troop area commander of the Nebraska State Patrol. The committee amendment would require that any police...any peace officer may submit a report to the patrol as a part of the application process indicating copies of offense reports, complaints, or other investigative reports. The amendment clarifies language relating to mental health information used to disqualify an applicant from licensure. Specifically, in the language that precludes an applicant from licensure, if he or she has been committed to a residential treatment facility due to abuse of a controlled substance or due to alcohol abuse within the prior three years. Language is added that would preclude licensure if the applicant has been admitted under emergency protective custody within the prior three years. Also there's clarifying language to harmonize subsection (7) with subsection (6). The amendment makes two clarifying changes to language regarding disqualification from licensure due to mental health conditions. It makes a clarifying change to the language regarding the database of mental health commitment information to be compiled by the Department of Health and Human Services. Further, the amendment clarifies language regarding locations at which concealed handguns may not be carried. The green copy stated that such could not be carried in the portion of an establishment which is primarily devoted to the sale of alcohol or consumption on the premises. Concerns were raised about enforcement difficulties resulting from ambiguity of the term "primarily devoted" so the committee amendment substitutes the room or rooms in which alcoholic liquor is dispensed of an establishment having a license issued by the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission for the sale of alcoholic beverage. And those rooms are exempt, those rooms only. This language is similar to the language in statute relating to locations where cigarette vending machines may be
