PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...maybe show some.... You said "time"?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Yes, I did, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You didn't give me my minute's warning.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Yes, I did, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh. Well, I wasn't paying attention. Good thing neither of us is armed right now. (Laughter)

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I turned off my...or waived off my speaking awhile ago because I really...I really don't care about this particular portion of the amendment. I don't care if it's \$75 or if it's \$100 fee. I, if it were up to me, I'd make it a \$10,000 fee or a \$20,000 fee or something that would set it so high that nobody would want to conceal carry in this state. I feel so strongly about this bill that I will resist it as long as I can through all three stages of debate and I have to say, Senator Bud Robinson, you're not here today, but you have been a long champion of resisting this bill so, Bud, this one's for you today. (Laughter) Hope you're listening. Senator Schellpeper mentioned that this was a firearms education bill. To me, that's not what it is at all. And I don't care what kind of education or what kind of certification that people have to go through in order to conceal carry. The fact of the matter is, and Senator Beutler pointed this out very clearly, more guns, more concealed carry, there's going to be more accidents and more people getting in trouble with the law, whether it is because they commit a crime or because they get into trouble with the law enforcement people while they are carrying. And, incidentally, I'm sure we'll talk about it later, but law enforcement has consistently been opposed, as an organization, as a body, to concealed carry, and they have good reason for being opposed to concealed carry. My problems with this bill are many and I hope to get into some of those at a later time on
