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law of this state to legally go about armed and dangerous, there should be a substantial fee which the person would have to pay. Let him or her be given pause in this process. Think about what is being undertaken and whether the circumstances impelling that person to want to carry a gun are so severe that a \$500 fee is reasonable. If a person were to walk into this place where the application is being taken and that person had bloodshot eyes, had liquor on his or her breath...I'd like to ask Senator Janssen a question because this is his bill and I don't want to get too presumptuous.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen, would you yield?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, would a person with bloodshot eyes be prevented from getting a license to carry this pistol if he or she met all these other requirements?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I'm sure if the...if that person had hay fever or something like that, he could have bloodshot eyes and that would not prevent him from getting a permit.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I'm not going to say what the bloodshot eyes are from, but bloodshot eyes alone would not stop the person from getting a permit.

SENATOR JANSSEN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would hands that shake as though the person had the palsy be sufficient to prevent a person from getting a license or a permit to carry a concealed pistol?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That could very well be, Senator Chambers, because if he would have a physical disorder would create him to be impaired enough that he would not be able to handle a weapon safety, that could be denied then, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is there anything in the bill that says that?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes, there is.
