SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if there's live shooting on the range, the ultimate purpose is to shoot somebody dead on the street. Isn't that why these people want to carry these guns, because they want to be in a position to kill somebody ultimately?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Hopefully...hopeful...hopefully, not, Senator, just in the case of being able to protect themselves if someone does want to inflict bodily harm upon them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How would you protect yourself with a pistol?

SENATOR JANSSEN: With a pistol?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Because we're talking about handguns.

SENATOR JANSSEN: How would I protect myself with a pistol?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yeah, in what way is a pistol used as a mechanism to protect oneself?
