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SENATOR JANSSEN: Or maim them if your life was being threatened by that other person.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If your life is threatened.... First of all, Senator Janssen, have you fired a pistol before?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have you fired a pistol when you were in terror of losing your life?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you, when you fired that pistol, hit what you were shooting at?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if you're in terror of your life might your aim even be a little less reliable?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, the only time I ever fired a pistol was when I was in the army, and that was with a 45 caliber and I was lucky if I hit the embankment behind the target, Senator.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Janssen, I fired a similar weapon in the army and I was lucky to hit the earth. But if we were...if we were confronted by somebody who wanted to take our life it would be even less likely that we'd hit what we point the gun at, isn't it true?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That is what the training is for, Senator Chambers, on this when we were talking about not the dead but the live shooting.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But wouldn't the training demonstrate that a pistol is not a very accurate weapon? Isn't that what the training would really show?
