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SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes, when you began the training, and I...but I imagine with the extended training that you would be able to hit what you were shooting at, hopefully.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And our time is up, so I won't...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...proceed right now.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Members of the body, I turned my light on 'cause I wanted to continue some of the discussion that I began earlier, but Senator Chambers' amendment has intervened and I do want to speak on the amendment and, Senator Chambers, I'm going to support your amendment even though I don't think it's high enough. I think a higher figure would be better. I also think that you raised proper questions about physical infirmities, which I also had marked my copy with questions on that particular section. But, Senator Janssen, I would like to go to the Chambers amendment, since we don't...we haven't talked too much actually about that yet, and the \$500 figure I think would probably maybe prevent a few more people from concealed carry but maybe not that many. But what I'm presuming that you did, and I want a response from you on this, I guess, is...did the...the Patrol or anybody else figure out what figure would be revenue neutral for the Patrol a far as how much money to charge for a fee? Could I have a little discussion with you on the mike about this?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And do you know...have any idea what they base these figures on?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, they were basing that on an estimate on how many...how many applications there would be, Senator Schimek.
