SENATOR JANSSEN: So that's where they based that on.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. Well, my concern with this is that, truthfully, that \$100 figure, I'm concerned that that doesn't even really do it. Because if you look at the bill and you go to page 3, for instance, first thing the Patrol has to do is adopt and promulgate rules and regulations, and have an application designed which will do all the things that are included on page 3 and 4. And then they have to take the application, they have to fingerprint the person, they have to photograph the person. They have to get a certified copy of a certificate of completion of handgun training and safety. They have to have a release on a form designed and provided by the Patrol that authorizes and requires disclosure to the Patrol of any information maintained by the Department of Health and Human Services, as required in Section 8 of this act, which means they have to have some more interaction with Health and Human Services. They have to have a completed form designed and provided by the State Patrol stating that the applicant has become knowledgeable about child endangerment. They have to have...make sure that there's a valid driver's license...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...or Nebraska-issued state identification card to identify the person. They have to then forward a copy of the application to a sheriff's department or to that county's chief law enforcement officer and require a report back from them, and my time is going to run out and this is just the beginning of the process and, again, I want to raise the question of how much time this is going to take from our Patrol from doing the job that they really are selected and training to do, and that is law enforcement. And I'm going to pursue this point because there's much, much more under this bill that the Patrol must do to validate this concealed carry...
