your license and walk out. And, gee, I have not heard of any blood baths being taken in the state of South Dakota. Senator Janssen mentioned this morning that there was 170-some thousand...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...licenses issued in the state of Texas. I haven't heard of any blood baths happening down there. As a matter of fact, it's a nonissue in the state of Texas. People who opposed handguns in the state of Texas, prior to the concealed carry law, have openly admitted, in public forum, that they were wrong, nothing has happened. And I think nothing will happen here. We hear estimates of 18 to 20,000 people. I doubt very much that half that number would ever apply. So I think there's plenty of factual information that you can have for the asking or for the looking. I believe everybody here got a copy of Lott's book, More Guns, Less Crime, and nobody bothers to attack that on a factual...
