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Nebraska, the Police Chief's Association of Nebraska, the Nebraska Sheriff's Association, and the Nebraska Association of Law Enforcement Firearms Instructors. And they shall be appointed by their respective organizations. They shall advise the Superintendent of Law Enforcement and Public Safety on matters of training, license application information, data management, and other administrative issues with respect to the Concealed Handgun License Act, and so on and so forth. This is going to take, and I will argue and argue, again and again, for as many amendments as Senator Chambers wants to introduce, that \$100...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...doesn't really cut it. And, you know, if you don't have 18,000 applications, maybe it would be even worse. But I think that a higher fee would not only fund the program better, but I'm hopeful, of course, that not as many people would apply, because I wouldn't consider it worth it to pay the \$450, or whatever it is that we decide on. And if that discriminates, Senator Janssen, so be it. I don't want any more guns out there on the street. And I think that the majority of our citizens do not want that either. I do need to mention that I did get a constituent call, who is threatening to work against my re-election, if I didn't support this bill. And I'm sure that you've all gotten calls like that. And I am sorry, but I have to do what I feel in...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...my best conscience is the right thing to do. I bet I can find a few people who will work for me, too. Thanks.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Janssen, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor and members of the Legislature. We're talking about...Senator Schimek talked about the ladies...a ladies purse, what all you could find in a ladies purse. Yes, I know, I've seen my wife try to find a tube of lipstick in her purse, you know. (Laugh.) And
