PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion. Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Mr. President and members. Senator...is Senator Janssen...? Not...not here. Ah, who's another supporter of the bill? Raise your hand. Senator Tyson, question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Could you tell me how many people we have successfully prosecuted for stalking in the state of Nebraska?
